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"Norway's Sparebanken Sør Boligkreditt's pool becomes the 108th to hold Covered Bond Label"

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The **Covered Bond Label Foundation** (CBLF) is delighted to announce that the 108th Covered Bond Label has been granted to <u>Sparebanken Sør Boligkreditt</u> which has become the 92nd labelled issuer on the Covered Bond Label <u>website</u>.

Commenting on this latest development, Luca Bertalot, Covered Bond Label Foundation Administrator, said:

"The Covered Bond Label is a concrete market-led initiative towards greater harmonisation and transparency in the covered bond market. Sparebanken Sør Boligkreditt's adhesion builds on the momentum that the Covered Bond Label is gaining in Norway and the commitment to transparency of issuers in that jurisdiction."

To recap, the Covered Bond Label is a quality Label, of which the primary purpose is to highlight to investors the security and quality of covered bonds, and to further enhance recognition of and trust in the covered bond asset class.

The Covered Bond Label is open to all covered bond programmes that are compliant with the Covered Bond Label Convention and disclose their data by publishing the Harmonised Transparency Template (HTT). 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Notes to the Editor:

- 1. The Covered Bond Label Foundation (CBLF) was established in 2012 by the European Mortgage Federation European Covered Bond Council (EMF-ECBC). The Covered Bond Label website became fully operational on the 1st of January 2013, with the first Labels being effective since then. The website features the Harmonised Transparency Template (HTT) and 14 National Transparency Templates, published by 92 issuers disclosing information on 108 labelled cover pools across 16 jurisdictions. The Covered Bond Label website currently provides issuance data on over 4,400 covered bonds, amounting to a total face value of over 1.5 trillion EUR, out of which over 2,400 covered bonds already include information on the Liquidity Coverage Requirement (LCR).
- 2. Established in 1967, the European Mortgage Federation (EMF) is the voice of the European mortgage industry, representing the interests of mortgage lenders and covered bond issuers at European level. The EMF provides data and information on European mortgage markets, which were worth over 7 trillion EUR at the end of 2015. The EMF currently has 17 members across 14 EU Member States as well as a number of observer members.

In 2004 the EMF founded the European Covered Bond Council (ECBC), a platform bringing together covered bond issuers, analysts, investment bankers, rating agencies and a wide range of interested stakeholders. The ECBC currently has over 110 members across more than 30 active covered bond jurisdictions and many different market segments. ECBC members represent over 95% of covered bonds outstanding, which were worth nearly 2.5 trillion EUR at the end of 2015.
